Cross Country Event

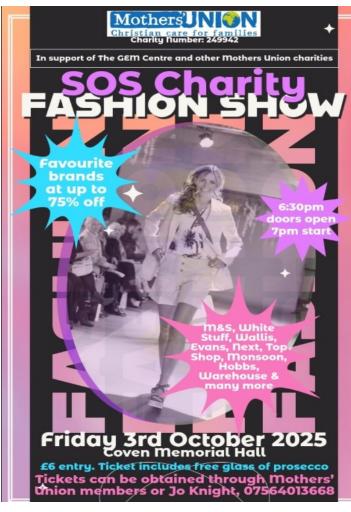

SNAP STREAK

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? With over 900 million active monthly users and billions of 'Snaps' sent each month, Snapchot is a popular messaging app among children and young people. It allows users to share fun, spontaneous pictures and videos with friends and family while using playful filters. One of Snapchot's unique features is that pictures, videos and messages are only viewable for a short period of time.

ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE

Enopoliot's use of criticial intelligence (AI) includes features like the TNy AF chatbot and AI-powered filters, offering interactive experiences that can be fun but also pase risks. These tools may share unliftered or inaccurate responses, promote unwall site beauty standards, and coelect personal data. Advanced filters and deoptate-style tensor can distort reality, potentially leading to manipulation, impersonation, or inappropriate content.

SCREEN ADDICTION

Snopshal boosts user engagement and daily use with features like streaks (daily snapshal exchanges between you and a friend). When is streak's been geing for a lew days, user will see a learned. These pold features may encourage young users to spend money to access exclusive content, increasing the risk of overspanding or feeling pressured to make in-acce surchases.

ACCESSIBILITY

INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

Encourage them to regularly review these settings, especially after app updates or changes in their historiahilo prouce.
