


"Love your neighbour as yourself." - Luke 10:27

Still the best-selling game of all time, Minecraft is a bastion of creativity and community, with hundreds of militions of players building and crafting in its almost endless world. The popularity of Minecraft among gamers of all ages means it's important to remain informed about the game, including how to play it safely and whether it's suitable for the children in your care. That's why we've created this guide explaining the risks associated with Minecraft and how to ensure a purely enjoyable gaming experience.
